They are an intergenerational family of eight with five children, Isaiah, Lucy, Ratika, Luisah, and Petunia. Isaac's mom, Petunia, also lives with them. Amelia works part-time at the Portland Oregon Temple - Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and Isaac works for the Salem Keizer School District.

The family enjoys being together outdoors, attending service at their local church, and spending time with extended family. They are of proud of their Marshallese heritage and especially enjoy May Day activities celebrating Independence Day for the Marshall Islands.

Currently, they live in severely overcrowded conditions in a two bedroom apartment. The children have no safe outdoor space to play. When they become homeowners they will enjoy a safer neighborhood and will be closer to friends and family.

Isaac and Amelia are looking forward to owning an affordable home that is large enough for their family. They know homeownership will increase stability and be a legacy for their children. The family is excited to work alongside volunteers and get to know their new neighbors. Meanwhile, the kids are looking forward to their own bedrooms, making new friends, and discovering parks to play at!

Meet the second 2021 Habitat homebuyers, Andy and Caroline! They have three children, Malachi, George, and Sammy. Andy and Caroline both serve as missionaries for South Salem's Youth with a Mission (YWAM) campus, where they also currently live. Their family enjoys playing soccer together and with the local Capitol Timber soccer club. They also enjoy exploring forests and camping.

Andy and Caroline met and began their lives together in Salem. During their 17 year service as missionaries, they have lived in many different places including Amman, Jordan. When circumstances meant they had to leave Jordan, the family moved to Salem.

The proximity to OHSU Doernbecher Children's hospital was an important factor for their return, as Sammy needs special medical care. Owning an affordable home means the family will have the stability and safety they need, especially as the boys grow.

The family looks forward to participating in the diverse community of the Samaritan Lane neighborhood and being able to open their home and use it as an extension of their family. Andy and Caroline believe that families play a fundamental role in creating a strong and thriving community.
